VICTIMS & FAMILIES START CONNECTING THE DOTS TO BP

They thought they were alone and no one cared, but victims and families are finding each other through town hall meetings as they open their eyes and share their stories.

As it turns out, there is a “Part 2” to the health consequences of the British Petroleum Deepwater Horizon gulf oil spill. Many cancers take 8-12 years to show up after exposure to crude oil and the Corexit dispersant. Later is now. April 21, 2018 was the 8th anniversary of the oil spill.

Disappearing victims would be a cheaper solution for British Petroleum as people fall ill and die without connecting the dots, without ever knowing British Petroleum was liable, or that they used their own insurance company and/or the state’s budget to pay for health expenses that rightfully belonged to British Petroleum.

The State of Louisiana noticed this so they passed Senate Resolution 16 on May 31, 2018 to urge them to implement a real and effective medical monitoring and screening program along with publish a medical protocol advisory to help victims and the medical community recognize crude and Corexit exposure symptoms early, reduce diagnosis time, and how to proceed from there.

The 21-year program that British Petroleum instituted in the 2014 settlement funded on primary care and excluded all symptoms experienced from exposure to the deadly crude oil and the Corexit dispersant.
